GCSE SUCCESS AT IMBERHORNE SCHOOL

Imberhorne is celebrating another successful year as Y11 students receive their GCSE exams results today.

264 students were entered for around 2300 GCSE examination. 75% of the students have achieved 5 or more high grade passes (A* - C) and 62% of the students achieved 5 or more passes including English, Mathematics and Science.

25% of all the entries led to passes at grades A or A*; 20 students gained 8 or more passes at grades A or A* and about a quarter of all the students achieved 5 or more passes at A or A*.

Jon Ford, Headteacher states:

"I am very proud of the achievement of Year 11 this summer. These results are very good; the students in Y11 have worked extremely hard and have been very positive, both in their studies and in their contributions to the life of the school. There have been many outstanding results but what matters most is the progress of each individual. My congratulations go to the students and my gratitude to the teachers and parents who have supported them so well in their preparations for these examinations."

Bob Darvill, Chairman of Governors, adds:

"These results are a credit to the students and a testament to their persistent hard work and effort that they have put into their studies over the past two years. The school is justly proud of their many and varied achievements to date, and is confident of their continued success in all their future endeavours."

Matthew Swan, Head of Year 11, comments:

"I have been proud to work with this Year group and I am delighted by their success. I have known these students since they joined the school 5 years ago and they have been wonderful young people to work with. Students of all abilities have worked hard to reach the ambitious targets that were set for them."

The vast majority (about 200) of the students will return in September to join the Sixth Form although some will be attending colleges or starting full time employment.
