


PC Sam Tichband was in school on 14th March supporting our Year 9 Relationships and Sex Information day. He was delivering sessions on the law, consent and safety to our students.

Students from Y8 & 9 travelled to Holy Trinity School on 6th March where they took part in a Maths Team Challenge. Competing against 20 other schools, mostly private and grammar, they did really well and came 14th.



Thermo Fisher Scientific visited our Y10 Science students to run microbiology workshops on 19th & 21st March. Students prepared plates using an Automated Inoculation Machine which is used to look at the effectiveness of different antibiotics against specific bacteria. They were also shown, and had a go at, using a dry spot test kit that can be used to detect specific bacteria such as E. Coli. The Thermo Fisher staff were fantastic and spoke to the students about their qualifications and career paths too.

Homework Setting

Homework may be viewed in several ways

- Via 'Outlook' in school or by logging in via Remote Access

Homework, or 'learning at home' is a really important part of a student's education. Recent research by the Education Endowment Foundation suggests that in over just one year, students can make five months' additional progress if they apply themselves diligently to independent work outside of the classroom.

On a basic level it improves student knowledge as working at home is an opportunity to practise what has been learnt in lessons.

However, homework is far more than that. It makes what is taught in the class relevant. Importantly, it gives students the chance to explore the subject independently, allowing them to take responsibility for their own learning.

More recently, teachers are utilising an approach called "flipped learning" where the work done at home will prepare the students for the learning in lessons that is to come. This is a very powerful technique which ensures that the time our students spend with their teachers, who are the subject experts, is maximised.

Study skills and revision skills are taught in school and should then be practised at home. Therefore it is often that the skills that students are developing and embedding, are as important as the completing the tasks set.

Deadlines can have a positive effect on the future development of students. Not only do they encourage students to use their time wisely, they promote self-discipline and good habits that will be important later in life. The home school connection is improved through home learning too. Homework encourages parents to get involved with their child's learning and what they're doing at school and encourages parents to spark their child's enthusiasm.

Assembly Aims & Attendance Advice

Mr D Jones, Assistant Headteacher, presented assemblies focused on some of the great work that takes place both at home in the UK and abroad by Comic Relief in the week of 11th March. He acknowledged that all charities rely on fundraising, but the assemblies also focused on the crucial aspect of people giving their time and volunteering.

Mr Jones shared many examples of Imberhorne staff who volunteer for various local projects or national charities. Hopefully some students will be inspired to volunteer themselves if they are not doing so already, which we know many of our students are.



In the week of 18th March, Mrs Timson, Assistant Headteacher, focused her assemblies on our ability to help others. Students were asked to think about someone who is their “go to” person when they need help and to consider the characteristics of that person. What makes them so special? She shared three inspirational stories from young people, Ella Madgwick, Max Johnson and Omar Sharif, who despite their own personal difficulties are helping other people and changing lives.

Q. What can I do to encourage my child to have excellent attendance?

A.

- ❑ Create good routines for mornings so that your child can arrive punctually, this will also mean your mornings can start calmly too.
- ❑ Read all school communications.
- ❑ Attend school information evenings and functions.
- ❑ Check your child understands their homework and that it has been completed.
- ❑ Share any education concerns your child or you may have with the appropriate member of school staff.
- ❑ Try to make medical/dental appointments out of school hours.

Your child will learn the importance of education and it's value within your family. This can have a lifelong effect.

Parents' Forum

We would like to share details of the recent meeting held between parents and Headteacher, Mr Brown on 19th March 2019.

Character Education

Mr Brown explained that discussions had been taking place with staff to determine how to best prepare our students for the 21st Century. Contributions from staff and a subsequent working group had identified a number of qualities and skills that were considered important to embed in students. These were:

Empathy and Resilience
Collaboration and Communication
Creativity and Critical thinking

He said that the challenge for the school was to find ways that these characteristics could be developed. This could be a long-term process of building and improving the way character education is provided. The idea might be to establish a termly focus on one or more of these qualities with, for example, external speakers and arts immersion days.

Mr Brown noted that whilst the term disadvantaged was usually applied in a financial context, he felt it could also be associated with a lack of life experiences. The Imberhorne pledge would be to provide 'cultural capital'; the aim would be for all students to have opportunities such as:

Live theatre, live music, visiting a gallery, visiting a museum, listening to an author or poet talk about their work, a live sports event, participation in a multicultural celebration, participation in a residential trip.

Parents/Carers expressed their support for the Imberhorne pledge, noting how memberships of clubs and extra-curricular activities helped to build resilience and widen students' horizons. There was praise for the establishment of our Masterclass sessions.

Behaviour Management

Mr Brown explained that whilst there were many school rules on a range of different aspects of school life, he was exploring a different approach by focussing on behaviour expectations. These expectations could be summed up by:

Be Ready * Show Respect * Have Pride

This language would be appropriate to use in many settings and situations. It would hopefully shape behaviours by explaining the school's expectations. The intention is to launch the new approach in September.

Being a Governor

Chair of Governors, Bob Darvill spoke to the forum about the role of governors. He explained that the purpose of the governing body is to consider strategic issues relating to areas such as finance, premises, school ethos and student behaviour. Meetings take place 3 times per term, in the evening. In addition to attendance at meetings, members of the governing body can take part in other activities such as learning walks if their commitments allow.

Governors can be attached to a particular department and meet with staff to learn more about that aspect of the curriculum or school life. Training is available through West Sussex CC. There is currently a vacancy for a parent governor and another vacancy will arise shortly for a co-opted member. Mr Darvill encouraged any parent or carer who was interested in becoming a governor to contact him, or Mr Brown to find out a little more about the role.
